Primary School Improvement

The autumn term has provided further opportunities for staff, from both primary and secondary phases, to work collaboratively on our trust improvement priorities. These are based around supporting pupils with Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs (SEMH) and improving standards in writing and mathematics.

Our writing improvement journey in primary schools continues. We now have consistent writing expectations across the range of year groups and taught genres in our schools and these are being used to inform each schools' unique curriculum plans.

Maths leaders are also working together to consider how the primary maths curriculum aligns with key stage three, and beyond, and where tweaks or emphases can be made to better support transition.

Year 6 assessment practices have been arranged to allow for moderation of standards and comparative data across the trust. Y6 practitioners meet regularly to discuss experiences and share effective curriculum ideas, demonstrating support for each other and a collective responsibility to meet aspirational curricular targets for all pupils in their final primary year.

Plans are also underway for our first SYMAT training day in February when we hope to bring together all staff from our primaries to further enhance classroom practices in each of our priority areas.

As always, it is an absolute privilege to work amongst such dedicated, committed and supportive colleagues. I look forward to further exciting developments in the New Year but, until then, I wish everyone an enjoyable and relaxing festive season with family and friends.

What a fun-filled and jam-packed term we have had here at Dunnington Church of England Primary School filled with lots of fantastic learning, school trips, author visits, pantomimes, sporting success and rounded off with a wonderfully festive Nativity this week. It has been wonderful to see the

children in reception settle in so fantastically and to welcome their families into the Dunnington school community.

We have been working hard to achieve our ADHD Friendly School Accreditation over the last two terms. As part of the work for this award we have made 6 pledges:

- 1. We pledge to work with the ADHD Foundation to provide a training session for our staff team.
- We pledge to provide regular opportunities for all learners with ADHD to have access to physical activity and exercise during the school day.



- 3. We pledge to provide opportunities for all learners with ADHD to learn self-calming strategies such as breathing, progressive muscle relaxation or mindfulness.
- 4. We pledge to provide tactile resources in every classroom.
- 5. We pledge to produce a display for the whole school and hold one assembly to celebrate the achievements of people living with ADHD.
- 6. We pledge to provide information and support for parents and carers of children and young people with ADHD.

We are really proud of the work we have done towards this award and we will continue to strive to consistently put the best possible provision in place for all of our children, including those with special educational needs and disabilities – something we are all incredibly passionate about.

Five of our classes have been lucky enough to go on some amazing educational visits during the term. In September, Year 5 had a wonderful trip to Murton Park to learn all about the Anglo-Saxons. They had a brilliant day - chasing Vikings, making bees-wax candles and writing their name in Anglo-Saxon! In the same week, years one and two went on a wonderful adventure to RHS Harlow Carr. They explored the kitchen gardens, learnt how different vegetables and fruit grow, had stories in the woods and explored the play areas. In November, Year 6 went on a trip to the Merchant Adventurers' Hall and York Castle Museum. They learned about the history of the hall, were excited to see portraits of the famous York chocolatiers that their school houses are named after and came up with different business ideas for the Victorian



Times. They then walked to York Castle Museum, where they had a tour, played in the Victorian Street and went to the fashion gallery where they got to design new labels. Last, but not least, our reception class went on their first ever trip to Dunnington Library, where they got to listen to stories and choose class books.

As you would expect, every class did us proud on all the trips, epitomising our school values – thank you to all of the staff for arranging these wonderful enrichment opportunities.

We have also enjoyed an author visit from Toby Glover, where he led workshops in every class, a performance of the Enormous Christmas Pudding by Story Craft Theatre, completely free of charge, and we have been completely blown away by the children's amazing confidence and enthusiasm in this week's Nativity Performances.

Escrick Church of England Primary School News

Our pupils have been embracing a vibrant term of learning filled with exciting enrichment opportunities. From hands-on practical activities to creative workshops, our curriculum has

been brimming with activities designed to spark curiosity, encourage exploration and inspire a love of learning!

EYFS: Reception have had a fantastic first term in school, the children quickly developed friendships and an understanding of our school rules and values. We have enjoyed many activities including creating transient art faces, learning about Diwali and making clay diva lamps and helping stickman to escape from the ice. However, the children have particularly enjoyed our fortnightly forest school lessons and recently experienced their first forest school campfire where they sang songs and toasted marshmallows!

Year 1: Year 1 have been thoroughly enjoying their active and engaging curriculum. We have been working hard with our sentence writing and sentence checklist and have been putting this into practice whilst learning about the Naughty Bus. Children worked creatively to plan and design their own Naughty Bus scene, similar to that of the author. We then created our scenes using various equipment around the classroom as a stimulus for our writing. Linking closely with our Castle Topic this term and learning all about our local history of Clifford's Tower; Year 1 were thrilled to take part in our Fencing Day. All children thoroughly enjoyed learning the fundamentals such as 'Lunge', 'On Guard, 'Retreat' and 'Advance'.

Year 2: Year 2 kicked off the year with learning inspired by the book 'Traction Man is Here'.

After reading the book, we designed, made and performed puppet shows to retell the story from the book and even had a go at writing the hero's next adventure. In Science we have been learning all about materials. Children have investigated what materials have been used in our school and considered why that material might have been used for that purpose. The children were very passionate about the importance of reusing and recycling materials where possible and we had a go at making our own recycled paper!

Year 3: In Year 3, the children have been loving their history topic on Railways. On their exciting trip to the National Railway Museum, the class spent the morning in the Wonderlab space, where they tested their engineering skills and

built their understanding of forces by using the hands-on exhibits and watching a live demonstration. In the afternoon, they were excited to bring all of their learning to life when they visited the Great Hall to see so many of the locomotives they had been learning about in school, such as the Mallard, the Evening Star, and the Japanese Bullet Train!

Year 4: In Year 4, we have explored our creativity and carried out lots of hands-on learning in Science. In our sound topic, we made recycled wind, string and percussion instruments and played in a 'junk band' to learn about pitch and

vibrations. We also used data loggers to measure how soundproof different materials were and designed our own ear defenders. In History, we borrowed a box of artefacts from The Dig in York - we were amazed to find that there

were REAL Roman objects, mosaic tiles and a replica strigil that we had learnt about from the Roman Baths. All of this learning has culminated in the children presenting these objects, facts and activities for parents in our very own 'Roman Museum' experience!

Year 5: Year 5 have had an incredible term, packed with immersive and hands-on experiences that sparked both curiosity and excitement. Space Day was an unforgettable adventure, as VR headsets transported them across the cosmos for a breathtaking exploration of the universe, leaving everyone in awe of the wonders of space. The Spanish Restaurant brought language skills to life as pupils served one another, practiced ordering, and even paid for meals in Spanish, all while trying a range of delicious Spanish dishes.









Finally, during Victorian Day, children stepped into the past, following strict Victorian classroom rules, baking traditional recipes, and mastering the delicate art of cross-stitch, offering a true taste of life in another era.

Year 6: This term, Year Six has been diving into the fascinating world of ancient and modern China. Their learning journey began with an exploration of the Shang Dynasty, uncovering its rich history, and extended to studying the geography and trade of present-day China. A highlight was China Day, when visitors from the York Chinese Church brought the culture to life with lessons in Chinese language and numbers, calligraphy workshops, and fun chopstick challenges. The children also discovered the meaning behind Chinese zodiac symbols and sampled a variety of traditional Chinese snacks and foods. Children even transformed their classroom into a fully-fledged restaurant—China Diner! Parents were invited to enjoy a delicious three-course meal and green teal entirely planned, cooked, and served by the children

Christmas Activities: Pupils have been actively involved in a wide range of festive activities this Christmas. A highlight was the formation of a Christmas Choir, with students from both Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2, who performed at the local tea rooms and during the Carols around the Tree event on the village green. A group of Year 4 and 5 children took their lovely Christmas crafts (from Christmas Craft Club) to decorate a tree at York Minster! They created a range of decorations that focused on our woodland theme and the tree looked beautiful! KS1 and KS2 children also entered a tree in the annual St Helen's Church Christmas Tree Festival here in Escrick.
